Great news out of the Battlefords relayed by Doug Fehr, our rep on CCOPA in Saskatchewan. He tells of the successes they are having, one of which is highlighted by the vehicle picture below. Through making a connection with the BATC, they are not only involving helping themselves as COP volunteers but also are involving members of the various First Nations.

The article here is called "Creating Opportunities to Enhance the Lives of Community Members" and was taken from their website <u>www.batc.ca</u>. It's much more than what I have copied here so take a read.

"Established in 2007, the Battlefords Agency Tribal Chiefs Inc. (BATC) is a tribal council with the original first nations of Ahtahkakoop Cree Nation, Moosomin First Nation, Red Pheasant Cree

Nation, Sweetgrass First Nation, and Stoney Knoll First Nation signing the Convention Act. Two years later Saulteaux First Nation joined, followed in 2014 by Mosquito Grizzly Bear's Head Lean Man First Nation.

During the past 12 years the BATC has provided advisory services expertise to a number of areas within the community including housing planning, economic development, band governance, financial management, justice, and sports and recreation. Social development, employment and training, industry relations, and investments have been added to the list of expanding services.

The motto and guiding principle often associated with the BATC comes from the words of the late Chief Wayne Standinghorn: "Reduce social assistance clients by 5% per year." The Canadian Business Journal recently spoke with Kerry Sasakamoose, Director of Employment & Training at the BATC, which is located in North Battleford, a city of about 18,000, about 140km northwest of Saskatoon, making it the fifth-largest centre in Saskatchewan.

"BATC was established to provide quality services to the community and to enhance the economic wellbeing of the people who live there," begins Sasakamoose. "The Chiefs, the directors and the staff carry on that vision through the work we do each and every day."

Serving as a central development authority, the BATC is led by the Chiefs and focuses on the improvement of all aspects that directly impact the tribes' members' lives, facilitating advisory services in areas of economic development, social and cultural aspects, community infrastructure development and maintenance, education, recreation, programs for seniors and youth, justice initiatives, and health initiatives." **Copied from** www.batc.ca

The vehicle shown is a lease from the BATC. The patrol vehicle is on a 2-year lease with funding from the BATC and sponsorships are available as shown. The goal is to have a dedicated vehicle which creates some excitement, leading to recruitment, removes the barrier of personal vehicle use and removes citizen concerns about a "strange vehicle" driving around their neighbourhood.



Highlights from the Battlefords COP group:

Growth in number of blocks patrolled within the Battlefords from 17,225 to 36,600

- Increased number of patrols in the Town with focus on identified areas
- Acquisition of a dedicated & marked patrol vehicle supported by funding from BATC
- \bullet Growth in members from 15 in mid-2022 to 26 currently; 4 members in the application / training

process

• Acquisition of vests to better identify members

• Improved processes including member application and RCMP check-in prior to patrol departure

- Deeper relationship with the RCMP and CSO's, including "hot spot" document
- Participation and learnings from the Alberta COPA conference
- Piloted license plate fastener program

• Participation in over 12 community events (RCMP Bike Rodeos, Ag Safety Challenge, CSO Pack the

Patrol Unit, CSO Provincial training, City Community BBQ's & Movie Night, City & Town Street

Festivals, parade, etc.)

- Initiation of joint patrols and improved communication with CSO's
- Confirmation of the Pattison Media communications plan**



****** The Pattison Media campaign is 12 monthly 5 minute radio interviews on their AM and one FM station (different formats, so different audiences). We speak about various COPP topics which are all designed to support recruitment and the Security Camera Registry. Additionally there are digital ads that link to our Facebook page, and in a few weeks, our website that is still to be launched.

We passed on a copy of a video from Alberta last week. Have had a few comments with one or two saying that it was very timely. This was financed by Alberta COPs so your comments should be sent to them. I understand that over 500 people viewed the video in the first week. More videos are being produced with one in the draft satage at this time.

Exciting news for our volunteers in Alberta.

News posted on the RCMP website notes that Assistant Commissioner Rob Hill, Commanding Officer, Manitoba RCMP has been appointed to the rank of Deputy Commissioner and has been promoted to the position of Commanding Officer of the Alberta RCMP.

Having read his public statement, what stands out for me is his focus on Manitoba's efforts to advance reconciliation. To quote him, " I am proud that we launched the Manitoba RCMP's Reconciliation Story which sets a way forward for our organization. We were also the first division within the RCMP to launch a Joint Action Circle to address violence against Indigenous women, girls, and 2SLGBTQQ1A+ peoples. Both initiatives were implemented in close consultation with Indigenous leadership, organizations, community Elders, Knowledge Keepers, Survivors, and family members to help us on our journey towards meaningful reconciliation. "

He further stated that the Manitoba RCMPwill continue to be a police service focused on community engagement and operational excellence. Alberta will be fortunate to enjoy this same leadership. The Executive of CCOPA offers him all the best in his new position.
